7. Innovations and Best Practices

Though we had an alumni association this time they are invited even to the sports meet and college day not just as audience, instead as active participants. A signs of positive change through alumni support is already felt.

Nature club

Nature club has organized one day pogramme to initiate construction of a "botanical garden "at the government higher primary school Ubaradka Mittur , in collaboration with various oaranisations under Ubaradka Mittur gramapanchayath.

 - Science day celebration: The Department of Science has celebrated National Science Day in collaboration with Karnataka Academy of Science and Technology, Bangalore on 28th, February, 2016. Key note address was delivered by Dr.Kumar Hegde, Head, Dept of Botany, SDM College, Ujire on main theme "Make in India-Science and Technology driven innovations". Resource Persons Mr.Bhavishya, Scientist, CPCRI RS, Vittal spoke on "Green Technology for Better Tomorrow" and Dr.Jagannath Nettar, Head, Dept of Physics, FMC College, Madikeri has delivered lecture on "Awakening the scientific thoughts in younger generation". Various competitions such as quiz, collage and essay writing were conducted to the students of different colleges of Mangalore University.
 - Departmental notice boards are filled not just by 'Notices', instead they have become a value addition to the college. They give pleasant & enriching experience to the students of that department and enlighten students of other streams.
 - Department of MSW has organized a one day seminar on Employment Challenges and Opportunities. Dr.Chandrashekhra Damble, Founder, Sneha Educational Institution Sullia was the resource person. Session was followed by inter college competitions as planned in the beginning of the year.
 - Two students of MSW are working on a project 'Yuva Spandana' relating to youth mental health in associations with NIMHANS, Bangalore.
 - NCC, NSS, Rover Ranger and Red Cross units have successfully carried out activities as per their plan of action.
