A REPORT ON LEARNING RESOURCES

COLLEGE LIBRARY

INTRODUCTION:

Library as a center of learning resources was started with the establishment of the College in 1976. After the shift of the college to the own campus in 1977, the library had its independent existence in a room of about 600 sq.ft, with necessary furniture. The library grew in course of time to have separate sections for reference and reading. The present extent of the library is about 4000 sq.ft, and it is fully utilized. The staff of the library is also increased with the appointment of one Library Assistant, one clerk cum typist and one attender.

The growth of library in qualitative terms is also significant. From the beginning the library has been equipped with the reference books required for the courses introduced by the college year by year. There has been a reading section also which provides for the study of current affairs.

Every year the library is growing with the addition of new books. The increase in the number of volumes for every 5 years since the inception of library is as below:

FUNDS:

Apart from the college funds amounting to Rs. 1.60 lakhs, the U.G.C has provided funds for purchase of books to our library. During the 8th plan the U.G.C assistance provided was Rs 1.35 lakhs and during the 9th plan Rs. 2.10 lakhs. Also a fund of Rs .25000/- per year for purchase of books for vocational course is given by U.G.C and so far we

have received Rs.75000/- for this purpose. The entire U.G.C funds are fully utilized for the purchase of necessary books.

PROFILE OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

The physical education department was opened with the inception of the college in July 1996. However, the activities were started in full swing along with the shift of the college from a temporary building to this permanent campus in 1997. The Physical Education Officer Mr. M. Radhakrishna is working in this Department from the beginning. He was champion in weight lifting in Mysore University during 1971-72. The students coming from the remote rural background were encouraged to step into the realm of sports and games through this department. The main items in which our students took interest and excelled were Kabadi, Kho-Kho, Volley ball, Ball badminton, Cricket, Cross country race, Chess and most of the track and field events.

THE FACILITIES:

A separate sports room was allotted for the Department that provided foundation for its growth. The required sports materials were purchased promptly from the sports fund and were accumulated from year to year. A stock register is maintained in this regard which is updated every year. Stock verification is done every year by one staff member designated/nominated by the principal with the help of physical director. Reports of stock verification are maintained in the office of the Physical Education Department.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Our college has produced university level and national level players And a thletes from the early years. Mr. Kariappa was the star of our college in shot put and discuss who became Mysore University champion in 1979-80. Mr.Poonachcha was another sportsman who became champion of Mysore University in Decathlon event during 1980-82. He later became the National Champion in Decathlon. There have been many students who have shown exceptional performance in the Mangalore university sports competitions (See Annexure 12). Further our college has won Team Championship several times in Mangalore University (Annexure 13)

Our college has organized several Inter-Collegiate Tournaments successfully since 1990. During 2003-04 we have organized the Inter-Collegiate Kabaddi tournament for Men and Women (Annexure 14).

The college has organized Mangalore University Ball Badminton coaching camp for the University girl's team during December 2002. Our Physical Education Director was the coach for the team

MULTI-GYM:

NATIONAL CADET CORPS [SD]

INTRODUCTION:

NCC is a Premier Youth organization devoted to the all round development of our youth to become responsible citizens of our country. In order to inculcate the values of National integrity, selfless service, unity, discipline and adventurism among the youth, the Senior Division NCC (Boys) was started in this college on 8th September 1988. During the time of admission, the eligible volunteer students of 1st PUC class and 1st Degree class (Arts/Commerce/Science) are motivated to join NCC, along with the 2nd &3rd year NCC cadets. Since the inception of the Unit, we have the sanctioned strength of 110 Cadets filled every year Until 2001-02. Since 2 years the sanctioned strength is only 90 for our unit and we have the required enrolled strength of the Cadets.

OBJECTIVES:

The basic concept of NCC, does not aim to militarize the youth. Through its multi dimensional and value oriented activities in various fields, NCC not only infuses defense consciousness, it aims at moulding the character of youth and grooming them to achieve all-round personality. The main objectives are as bellow.

- 1. To develop qualities of character, courage, comradeship discipline, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and the ideals of selfless service among the youth, to make them useful citizens.
- To create a human resource of organized and motivated youth to provide leadership in all walks of life and available for the services of the nation.

- 3. NCC inculcates in the cadets social awareness and sense of responsibility towards the nation, it cultivates the ideal of service towards society. It educates the youth against social evils.
- 4. NCC helps to shake off diffidence of mind and narrowness of outlook. While attending camps, cadets live, eat and train together and acquire knowledge of others' traditions and customs, which in turn helps them to develop the spirit of unity, oneness, co-operation and brotherhood.

MAIN ACTIVITIES:

The multifarious Training activities of NCC are as bellow.

- 1) Institutional Training: As per the directives of NCC office; we are conducting 20parades(4 hours each) on every Saturday, from 1.30P.M To 5.30P.M (including Independence Day & Republic Day celebrations) during college working days. (July to Feb.).The Institutional Training Covers basic military training in Army subjects i.e. Drill, Weapon-Training, Field craft/Battle craft, Map reading etc. with the aim of preparing the cadets to appear for 'B' and 'C' certificate exams at the end of 2nd year and 3rd year NCC career.
- 2) Camp Training: Camp Training constitutes the most important part of the NCC Training. The camp training gives the cadets thrill and joy of outdoor life and also assists in developing comradeship, team work, group cohesion, qualities leadership and self confidence. Camps like Combined Annual Training Camps, Army Attachment camps, Tala sainik camps, National Integration Camps, Basic leadership camps, Advanced Leadership Camps, Trekking Camps, Independence Day Camp, Republic Day Camp, Mountaineering Camp, Rock Climbing, Para Sailing, Para Jumping etc are generally held in which cadets

from all parts of the country participate and contribute greatly towards promoting national integration. These camps widen the horizon of the young cadets and provide them an opportunity to forge bonds of national brotherhood. These camps have abridged the cultural gaps, broken regional, religious and language barriers and have brought the youth closer to each other.

- 3) Republic Day Camp: The Camp is held every year in the month of January from 05 January to 29 January at Garrison Parade Ground, Delhi. All the 16 State Directorates with about 1700 cadets from all over country are participating. During the camp, the cadets participate in the Republic Day parade and Prime Ministers Rally. They also put up displays high lighting various NCC activities and cultural programmes bringing the sense of national integration amongst the youth of our country. In addition they also participate in various inter-directorate competition.
- 4) **Independence Day Camp(IDC):** Subsequent to the inclusion of sports and games in the curriculum of NCC, IDC will be held every year at the national level in the month of August. Sports persons from all the NCC Directorates participate.
- 5) Adventure Training: Adventure activities are organized to develop special qualities of courage, leadership, spirit of adventure and sportsmanship, spirit of comradeship, team work and self confidence among the cadets. The activities organized include Trekking, Rock climbing, Mountaineering, Para jumping, Para sailing, Glider, Cycle expeditions etc in which cadets participate.
- 6) **Community Development:** The purpose of organizing these activities is to make our young people conscious and sensitive to the needs and problems of their fellow countrymen as well as to contribute meaningfully to enrich the community life. As an effective youth

organization with an eye on the future of the country, the NCC devotes a great deal of time and effort on activities like blood donation, adult-literacy, anti-dowry, anti-leprosy, anti-drug, tree plantation, eye donation, construction & repair of roads, Save Environment programmes etc.

- 7) Youth Exchange Programme: With a view to increase international understanding and awareness, the NCC has Exchange Programmes with Youth Organizations / NCC of nine countries namely Australia, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Canada, Maldivs, Nepal, Singapore, Srilanka and the United Kingdom. This exchange programme organizes mutual visit of NCC cadets for a period of 3 months.
- 8) **Sports/Games:** Sports and games is included in the curriculum of NCC to make it more attractive to the students and to explore the untapped source for sports persons. The outcome has been very encouraging and widely acclaimed.
- 9) Conduct of 'B' and 'C' Certificate Examinations: The eligible 2nd and 3rd year NCC candidates are made to appear for 'B' and 'C' certificate examinations. The examinations are conducted by NCC authorities in the month of February/March every year on the NCC curriculum which consists of theory and practical examinations (500 marks). The successful candidates are awarded with these (B' and 'C') certificates; which is very valuable for seeking career opportunities.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

1) Republic day Camp (New Delhi): Participation in the Republic Day camp at Delhi is the highest achievement in the NCC activities. 9 cadets from our college were selected and have participated in the prestigious Republic Day Camp at New Delhi since 1992-1993. In the

- year 1994-1995, our cadet Radhakrishna H.B. has secured Gold medal (National Integration Run) in the R.D. camp.
- 2) All India Trekking Camps: Since the year of inception that is 1998-1999, 21 cadets participated in the All India Trekking Camps held in various parts of India.
- 3) Army Attachment Camps: These camps give a very close picture of the Regimental way of life in the Army and way of functioning in the Army Regiment.
 - So far 37 cadets of our unit have participated in the Army Attachment Camps held in different Regiments of Army.
- 4) Basic Leadership Camps and Advanced leadership camps: With motive of grooming the best leaders of tomorrows the basic leadership camps and advanced leadership camps are held. Total 10 cadets from our college have attended Basic leadership camps/ Advanced leadership camps held at different places of country
- 5) National Integration Camps: Students join NCC when they are in their formative years and as such are in most impressionable age. This is the period when their character and behavior can be moulded. NCC makes use of this opportunity, inculcates the spirit of National Integration by actually getting the cadets from different states to live together and learn about each other. When the cadets from different states work shoulder to shoulder they are able to realize the importance of oneness of the nation. Since 1993-1994, 45 cadets have attended the National Integration Camps held at different parts of the nation.
- 6) Combined Annual Training Camps/R.D. Selection Camps: As per the directions and sanctions of NCC Directorate of Karnataka and Goa and Karnaka Government respectively, the Combined Annual Training Camps and R.D. Selection Camps are held as a regular feature of NCC

curriculum by the NCC authorities of different places of state. Maximum number of cadets would get opprtunity to attend these camps. 603 cadets have participated in various Combined Annual Training Camps/R.D. Selection camps held at different places of the state in the last 13 years (since 1989-1990).

- 7) NCC 'B' and 'C' certificate exams: As a reward for the efforts of cadets for the time they constructively spent in NCC, they are awarded with 'B' Certificates(2nd year) and 'C' Certificate (3rd year), after successfully passing the said examinations. Since inception (1998-1990) 348 cadets have passed 'B' Certificate examinations and 118 cadets have passed 'C' Certificate examinations.
- 8) Tala Sainik Camps (TSC): These are the camps specially concentrating on competitions like Firing, Map reading and Obstacle course. The successful cadets will attend the National Level Camps at New Delhi, which is a part of Republic Day Camps. From 2001-2002 onwards 4 cadets have participated in the Tala Sainik camps held at different places of the state.
- 9) **Basic Mountaineering Course:** As the unique and commendable and rare opportunity our cadet Chethan M.K. III B. A. the only cadet got selected from south India, has participated in the Basic Mountaineering Course held at Uttar Kashi (UP) by the Nehru Institute of Mountaineering during 1998(17-10-98 to 17-11-98) for one month.

10) Exclusive activities of the Unit:

- a) 97 cadets participated in the Saksharatha Andolana (30-7-90)
- b) 60 cadets have participated in the Shramadhan. (road repair), Sullia, Subrahmanya on 2-1-2000.
- c) 25 cadets donated blood on 31st October 1998 (organised jointly by NCC and Rotary Club of Sullia.)

Nehru Memorial College Sullia D.K

- d) 32 cadets donated blood on 24th August 2002 (organised jointly by NCC and Lions Club of Sullia.)
- e) Cycle expedition was conducted in which 19 cadets have participated.
- f) Since 1990-1991, as a part of adventure activity in NCC we have been conducting 2 days Trekking Programme every year, in which maximum cadets of our college participate.(Annexure 9).

HIGHLIGHTS OF NCC UNIT:

It is a matter of pride for our NCC units to that many of our former NCC cadets hold high officers today and have excelled in various walks of life. It also shows that the task of moulding the youth of this part of rural area to become better leaders of tomorrow has been well executed over the years.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS [SW]

INTRODUCTION:

NCC (SW) Girls Wing has been started in our college during 1999-2000 with the appointment of 2/Lt. Smt. Mcenakshi K as the associate NCC officer and she continues to serve even now. The sanctioned strength of the Wing is 50 and every year we have enrolled the full strength by motivating the eligible girls during the admission to the college.

BASIC OBJECTIVES:

The basic objective of establishing a Girls' Wing of NCC in our college is to provide an exposure to the girls of this rural region to participate in the nation building activities. It is hoped that their participation in NCC will open the doors for the girls to join the military and paramilitary forces & professional courses. The specific objectives of establishing the NCC (SW) Girls' Wing here are;

- To develop their personality
- To develop self confidence and courage in them
- To build their physic
- To teach decipline and uprightness in the day-to-day life.

MAIN ACTIVITIES:

Institutional training: It is carried out as weekly two parades each of two hours duration. In total 80 hours of parade per year are conducted on Saturday afternoons. The training covers basic military in army subjects drill weapon training, map reading firing, first aid etc.

New subjects have been added recently with greater emphasis on leadership[development, adventure oriented training, social service

and communication to enable the cadets to develop greater self confidence and render useful community service.

- Guest lecture arranged on topics of social awareness,
- Quiz Competitions are arranged for the cadets

Camp Training and Achievements:

The aim of the camp training is to provide the cadets an opportunity and experience to live together, cooperate and work as team members. The training is practical and adventure oriented. These camps are useful to the cadets, particularly in providing opportunities for maximum assimilation. The training prepares the cadets for various NCC certificate examinations as applicable.

The cadets of Senior Wing (Girls) of our college have participated in different camps organized by NCC units, Group, Dte & Director General of NCC. Each camp is 12 days of duration.

- Combined Annual Training Camps (CATC): This is the basic camp in which all types of NCC activities are organized. Based on the performance of the cadets in various competitions they are selected for further specific camps organised in group level Dte/ State and National level. So far 62 cadets have been participated in CATC held at Madikeri and other places.
- Talasainik Camps: This is the prestigious camp, which is conducted at group level, Directorate level and National level. Those who have participated in National and Directorate level camps are given preference in the academic admissions and government employment. So far 13 cadets have participated in Talasena Directorate level Selection camp held at Dharwad.
- Republic Day Camp: More weight-age is given to RD camp. Most outstanding cadets will be selected for higher camps and successfully reach upto the National level. It is conducted in group level,

Directorate level and National level. So far ten students have participated in Pre-RD in group level camp; seven students have been participated in Pre-RD selection camp one at Bangalore, four cadets in Pre-RD selection camp II and one cadet in Pre-RD selection camp III held at Bangalore.

National Integration Camp: This camp is organized for the cadets to inculcate the sense of oneness and commitment to the nation. So far 61 cadets have participated in National Integration Camps held at various places of India and have won few medals.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The National Service Scheme was launched on 24th September 1969 in commemoration with the celebration of the centenary of Mahatma Gandhiji. The objective was to materialize the dream of Gandhiji that the youth of the nation should be brought into direct contact with the social realities, so that they will develop the value of social responsibility and service. In fact, the National New Education rules framed in 1968 had suggested the need of establishing NSS Units in each College. The National Service Scheme has, thus become a youth movement in the whole country, being a supporting educational system in all colleges.

In our college, we have two NSS Units consisting of 100 studentsvolunteers in each unit. The first unit was started in 1977 with Dr. Chandrashekara B. Damle as the first NSS Officer of the college. Since the college was in its infant stage, there had been enough scope for shramadan work in the campus and also for the extension activities. The students coming from village areas had good sense of work and service. The second unit of NSS was started in 1997 and the tradition of NSS activities initiated in the beginning are continuing even now with some additional activities and programmes. The weekends are specifically used for Shramadhan programme and special camps on Sundays are arranged occasionally. Further the 10 days Annual Special Camps have been conducted every year from the beginning, in different villages of Sullia Taluk. During these camps major activities conducted were shramadan for the expansion of school playground, formation of roads, socio economic surveys, literacy programmes, AIDS Awareness programmes, seminars on environmental issues and so on. Adoption of near by villages and conducting series of activities in such villages have been a special programme of our NSS unit. In all these camps, the college has ensured the participation and active involvement of local people. In fact the programmes of felt needs of the people of the locality were taken up as major works in such camps.

The NSS unit of our college is rewarded with the Award of Best NSS Unit in the Mangalore University in the year 1993-94 and Sri. Poovappa Gowda of our college has been honoured as the Best NSS Officer in the same year. Two of our volunteers have participated in the Republic Day Parade at National Level and two other volunteers in the State Level RD Selection Camps.
